




STEP 1. Trace selected patterns onto tracing film to preserve the paper patterns. Lightly case your leather and place your patterns onto the grain side of the leather. Trace around the patterns with a stylus or dried ball point pen. When marking holes, be sure to check pattern sheet to make sure you mark only the holes needed for your selected style holster. Mark all stitch lines.




STEP 2. Cut holster parts out of leather with a sharp knife or Super Shears. Punch all holes with the size Mini Punch indicated on the pattern sheet.

IF YOU ARE GOING TO TOOL YOUR HOLSTER, DO SO NOW. WE DO NOT RECOMMEND CEMENTING THE LEATHER TO CARDBOARD BEFORE TOOLING UNLESS YOU ARE GOING TO LINE YOUR HOLSTER. DO NOT DIE OR FINISH AT THIS TIME.


STEP 3. Lay Holster Body out flat, grain side up. Using a No. 8047 Stitching Groover, gouge a stitch line on both sides of Holster Body as marked on pattern sheet. Gouge stitch lines marked on other parts of holster unless indicated on pattern sheet not to.



STEP 4. (If you do not wish to wet form your holster, skip to Step 6.) Apply Rubber Cement to flesh side of Holster Body, along stitch lines. Fold Holster over, grain side out, and adhere edges together.




STEP 5. Immerse leather in water until bubbles quit forming. When leather has dried back to its natural color, but is still cool to the touch, it is ready to form. Wrap pistol in plastic and push it into the holster. Mold leather with fingers around pistol. Leave pistol in holster until leather is completely dry. When leather is dry, remove pistol from holster and pull holster apart where it was cemented.






DO ALL DYEING AND FINISHING BEFORE GOING ON TO NEXT STEP. FINISH ALL EDGES EXCEPT WHERE HOLSTER BODY WILL BE STITCHED TOGETHER. THESE EDGES WILL BE FINISHED AFTER STITCHING.

STEP 6. FOR MILITARY FLAP HOLSTER ONLY: (If not making the Military Flap Holster, skip to Step 19.) Apply cement around rivet hole in Closure Tab on grain side and around rivet hole in Flap on flesh side. Align rivet hole in Closure Tab over rivet hole in Flap, flesh sides up; making sure the tab is aligned between the tab guide lines as marked on pattern sheet. Adhere Tab in place.



STEP 7. Push stud of large rivet up through holes from flesh side of Tab. Place a metal anvil or other hard riveting surface under rivet. Place cap of rivet over stud on grain side of Flap. Set concave end of rivet setter on rivet cap and strike sharply with a mallet until rivet is set.



STEP 8. Following stitch line on Flap pattern, Saddle Stitch Tab in place. See instructions in the back of this booklet for Saddle Stitching Instructions.


STEP 9. Apply cement to wide end of Belt Loop, on grain side, only around area of stitch line. Apply cement to area marked on grain side of Flap where Belt Loop is to be attached. Adhere Belt Loop to Holster as shown.




STEP 10. Saddle Stitch Belt Loop to Holster, following Saddle Stitching Instructions in the back of this booklet.




STEP 11. Fold Belt Loop over and adhere tip to Holster as in Step 9, except both grain sides will be up.






STEP 12. Saddle Stitch tip of Belt Loop in place along stitch line marked, following Saddle Stitching Instructions in the back of this booklet.




STEP 13. Using a No. 5 Overstitch Wheel, Mark stitching holes in gouge line on Button Patch.




STEP 14. Place ball of Brass Button in hole in anvil. Push hole in center of Button Patch down over post flesh side up. Place washer over post on leather. Set hole in Rivet Setter No. 1783 over post of Button and strike it with a mallet to drive the washer down tight against the leather.

STEP 15. If post sticks up more than 1/8" above the washer, cut the post off close to the washer with side or end cutters.




STEP 16. Set concave recess of Rivet Setter over post and strike setter with a mallet, turning setter as you strike, to round the end of the post as it spreads over the washer. When the setter is removed, a few blows with a hammer may be used to flatten the post end more.




STEP 17. Cement Button Patch in place as indicated on pattern sheet, grain sides up.






STEP 18. Saddle Stitch Button Patch in place, following instructions in the back of this booklet.




STEP 19. Apply Craftsman Cement to flesh side of holster, along stitch lines only. Fold holster over, grain side out, and adhere edges together. Using a No. 5 Overstitch Wheel, mark stitch holes in groove on front of holster only.




STEP 20. Saddle Stitch Holster Body together following Saddle Stitching Instructions in the back of this booklet. Finish edges along stitch line.


STEP 21. FOR BUCKLED HOLSTER LOOP ONLY: (If you are using a Laced Holster Loop, skip to Step 27.) Thread slotted end of Holster Loop through 1" Buckle, pulling tongue of Buckle out through slot. Fold end over, flesh sides together, and align rivet holes.




STEP 22. Insert medium rivet stud through holes from underside of Holster Loop. Place a metal anvil or other hard riveting surface under rivet. Place cap of rivet over stud on top of Loop. Set concave end of rivet setter on rivet cap and strike sharply with a mallet until rivet is set.




STEP 23. FOR FULL SKIRT SLOTTED HOLSTERS ONLY: (If you are going to rivet your Loop to your Holster, skip to Step 24A.) Thread Holster Loop through slots in skirt, grain side up on flesh side of skirt. NOTE: Make sure the buckle end of the Loop will come around the stitched side of the Holster. Skip to Step 25.






STEP 24A. FOR RIVETED FULL OR HALF SKIRT HOLSTERS ONLY: (If you used slotted full skirt Holster, skip to Step 25.) Wrap Holster Loop around Holster Body, centering buckle on the front of Holster. Fold skirt over, flesh side out, and center Holster Loop under rivet holes in skirt. Mark position of rivet holes on Holster Loop. NOTE: Photo shows Half Skirted Holster. Full Skirted Holsters which are to be riveted are done the same way.)




STEP 24B. Remove Holster Loop from holster and punch rivet holes just marked. Align rivet holes in skirt over rivet holes in Holster Loop, grain sides together. NOTE: Make sure the Buckle end of the Holster Loop comes around stitched side of the Holster. Set rivets as in Step 22.




STEP 25. Fold skirt over, flesh side out, and wrap Loop around Holster Body. Thread billet end of Loop through buckle. Pull up snug. Press tongue of buckle against billet so that it makes an impression in the leather.


STEP 26. Punch hole in billet on mark with a No. 4 Mini Punch and buckle the Loop. You may trim the billet end if desired and edge and finish the tip. Skip to Step 30.




STEP 27. FOR FULL SKIRT SLOTTED HOLSTERS WITH LACED HOLSTER LOOP: (If you are using a riveted laced Holster Loop, skip to Step 28.) Thread Holster Loop through slots in skirt, grain side up on flesh side of skirt and with longer side of ends pointing toward the Holster Body. NOTE: Ends of Loop must be folded over and worked through slots. Skip to Step 29A.




STEP 28. FOR FULL OR HALF SKIRT RIVETED HOLSTERS WITH LACED HOLSTER LOOP: Align rivet holes in skirt over rivet holes in Laced Holster Loop, grain sides together and with longer side of ends pointing toward the Holster Body. Insert medium rivet stud up through each set of holes from flesh side of Loop. Place a metal anvil or other hard riveting surface under stud. Place caps of rivets on studs on flesh side of skirt. Set concave end of rivet setter on rivet cap and strike sharply with a mallet until rivet is set. Repeat on other rivet cap. NOTE: Photo shows half skirt holster. Full skirt holsters are done the same way.







STEP 29A. Fold skirt over and wrap Holster Loop around Holster Body. Using 18" of Latigo Lace, push one end in hole No. 1 and the other end through hole No. 2, from grain side of Loop. NOTE: Be sure to keep the grain side of the lace up on the grain side of the Loop. Pull both ends through until stitch is snug.




STEP 29B. Push lace from hole No. 2 up through hole No. 3 from flesh side of loop and down through hole No. 4 from grain side of Loop.




STEP 29C. Push lace from hole No. 1 up through hole No. 6 from flesh side of Loop and down through hole No. 5 from grain side of Loop.



STEP 29D. Push lace from hole No. 4 up through hole No. 7 from flesh side of loop and down through hole No. 8 from grain side of loop.



STEP 29E. Push lace from hole No. 5 up through hole No. 8 from flesh side of Loop and down through hole No. 7 from grain side of Loop (two laces across bottom holes). Tie lace ends together in a knot and trim off excess lace.




OPTIONAL HAMMER THONG FOR CUT AWAY HOLSTERS


STEP 30A. Insert pointed end of Hammer Thong through hole closest to folded side of Holster Body from grain side and back through other hole.




STEP 30B. Put pistol in Holster and push slit in large end of Hammer Thong over hammer of pistol. Pull pointed end of thong until thong is tight. Trim off pointed end of Thong to within 3" of hole.




STEP 31A. FOR FULL SKIRT HOLSTERS ONLY: (Half skirt Holsters skip to Step 32A.) Using 4 ft. of Latigo Lace, push one end of lace through one top hole in skirt, from flesh side and the other end through other top hole in skirt, from flesh side. Pull ends until they are even and stitch is tight.






STEP 31B. Push lace ends through corresponding holes in bottom of Holster Body and pull snug.




STEP 31C. Push left lace through right bottom hole in skirt from grain side and push right lace through left bottom hole in skirt from grain side. This forms an X.



STEP 32A. FOR HALF SKIRT HOLSTERS ONLY: Using 4 ft. of Latigo Lace, push one end through left hole in bottom of Holster Body from grain side and the other end through the right hole. Pull both ends until they are even and you have a loop at the bottom of the holster.

STEP 32B. Thread both ends through the loop and pull tight.



SADDLE STITCHING




STEP 1. Push one end of thread through eye of needle about $\frac{1}{2}$ ".




STEP 2. Pierce thread with needle point as shown.



STEP 3. Push thread up on needle to eye. Pull ½" end of thread through eye as far as it will go. Hold needle and pull thread over eye of needle. Repeat this on other end of thread with other needle.




STEP 4. After holes are marked with No. 5 Overstitch Wheel, Stab hole with stitching awl. Insert one needle through hole and pull through until you have an even amount of thread on each side of the leather.




STEP 5. Stab next hole. Insert needle on back or inside of leather through hole and pull thread through.



STEP 6. Insert needle from outside or front of leather through same hole, being careful to go over first thread. DO NOT PIERCE THREAD. Pull through. Grasp both threads and pull stitch snug. Continue stitching this way until you reach last hole.




STEP 7. Go through last hole with both threads and pull stitch snug. Stitch back through last two stitches to secure thread. Trim thread off close to leather. Tap all stitches down with a mallet.




STEP 8. Run Overstitch Wheel over all of the stitches.


EDGE FINISHING



STEP 1. After stitching is done, use a No. 2 Edge Beveler to edge both sides of project. Hold beveler at approximately a 45 degree angle.



STEP 2. Moisten the edges of the leather and rub briskly back and forth with a Circle Edge Slicker to create a smooth burnished edge.



STEP 3. For a more professional look, apply Edge Dressing to all finished edges with a felt dauber.






READ ALL INSTRUCTIONS CAREFULLY BEFORE BEGINNING ASSEMBLY!



STEP 1. Determine size belt needed by measuring around area where you wish the belt to ride. Some people may wear their belt around their waist, some wear it lower on their hips and some prefer it lower on one side than the other.




STEP 2. The pattern on the pattern sheet is drawn to fit a size 30. Trace patterns onto tracing film to preserve the paper patterns. To lengthen your pattern, subtract 30 from size needed and divide by 2. (For example, we are making a size 38 belt. A size 38 belt would be 8" larger that a size 30. Divide 8" by 2 and you get 4".) Cut your tracing film pattern out and cut it apart on dotted lines on each side of the slot. Lay pattern on brown paper and tape down the piece with the slot. Add your measurement (4") to both ends of this piece and tape ends of pattern in place, following the curve of the belt. Sketch in connecting lines on brown paper. Cut altered pattern out of brown paper and check the fit before transferring the pattern to the leather.




STEP 3. Lightly case your leather and place your altered belt pattern and other belt parts on the grain side of the leather. Trace around patterns with a stylus or dried ball point pen. Mark all holes and stitch lines. Mark holes and positioning line on square end of belt by placing the original tracing over the outline scribed on the leather (see photo 3A). Mark position line on pointed end of belt by placing Billet Positioning Pattern on pattern sheet over the outline of the pointed end scribed on the leather (see photo 3B).


STEP 4. Cut Belt parts out of leather with a sharp knife or Super Shears. Punch all holes with the size Mini Punch indicated on the pattern sheet. Cut out slots.





STEP 5. Using a No. 8074 Stitching Groover, gouge around stitch lines on Billet and Buckle End.




DO ALL TOOLING, DYEING, FINISHING AND EDGING BEFORE GOING TO NEXT STEP








STEP 7. Mark holes in gouged lines on Billet and Buckle End with a No. 5 Overstitch Wheel.




STEP 8. Cement end of Billet to Belt on line marked on pattern, grain sides up (see photo 8A). Snap first snap in Buckle End to Belt and line up straight before adhering Buckle End in place on Belt (see photo 8B).




STEP 9. Saddle Stitch Billet and Buckle End to Belt following instructions in the back of this booklet.

STEP 10. Punch two holes in each end of both Keepers with an awl. Stitch ends together by beginning on flesh side of keeper in hole No. 1. Leave about 2" of thread in hole with which to tie off. Stitch across to hole No. 2 on other end of Keeper and enter from grain side. Then stitch back across to hole No. 3 from flesh side and back to hole No. 4 from grain side.




STEP 11. Pull ends of thread to tighten stitches, making sure the ends of the Keeper butt against each other. Tie ends of thread together on back of Keeper and trim off excess thread. Do both Keepers the same way.




STEP 12. Slide Small Keeper on Buckle End, past first snap. Thread Buckle End through 1¾" buckle, pulling buckle tongue out through slot. Snap first snap. Slip Large Keeper over end of Belt and position between first snap and slot in Belt. Stick Buckle End down through slot in Belt and pull through. Snap end snap.




SETTING BELT SNAPS






NOTICE the eyelet and stud positions in the Belt are reversed in each hole. In the end hole the eyelet enters from the grain side of the leather. In the next hole the eyelet enters from the flesh side of the leather.

NOTICE on Belt End the button and socket positions are reversed in each hole. In the end hole the socket enters from the grain side of the leather. In the next hole the socket enters from the flesh side of the leather.





To set the button and socket, place the button of the snap in the round indentation of the anvil. Push socket through hole in leather and into button. Set Snap Setter 16SB in hole in socket and strike setter sharply with a mallet until snap is set. (Be sure socket is entering from the correct side of the leather.)

To set eyelet and stud, place the stud in the appropriate hole in the anvil. Push eyelet through hole in leather and into stud. Set Eyelet Setter in hole in eyelet and strike sharply with a mallet until snap is set. (Be sure eyelet is entering from the correct side of the leather.)


STEP 1. Push one end of thread through eye of needle about $\frac{1}{2}$ ".





STEP 1. Trace pattern onto tracing film to preserve the paper patterns. Lightly case your leather and place your patterns onto the grain side of the leather. Trace around the patterns with a stylus or dried ball point pen. Mark all holes and stitch lines.





STEP 2. Cut Pouch parts out of leather with a sharp knife or Super Shears. Punch all holes with the size Mini Punch marked on pattern.




STEP 3. Using No. 8074 Stitching Groover, gouge around stitch line on Front and Back only on grain sides.


STEP 4. Place Back on work surface, flesh side up. Using No. 8082 Adjustable "V" Gouge or 1812 Adjustable Gouge, gouge along the two fold lines as marked on pattern. NOTE: Gouge no deeper than ½ the thickness of the leather.


DO ALL TOOLING, DYEING AND FINISHING BEFORE GOING ON TO NEXT STEP. FINISH ALL EDGES EXCEPT WHERE POUCH FRONT AND BACK WILL BE STITCHED TO GUSSET. THESE EDGES WILL BE FINISHED AFTER STITCHING.


STEP 5. Align hole in one end of Belt Loop over one top hole in Back, grain sides together, with Loop pointing toward flap, as shown. Insert medium rivet stud up through holes from flesh side of Back. Place metal Anvil No. 1804 or other hard surface under rivet. Place cap of rivet on stud on flesh side of Loop. Set concave end of Rivet Setter No. 8100 on rivet cap and strike sharply with a mallet until rivet is set.

STEP 6. Fold Belt Loop over and align hole in other end of Loop over bottom hole directly below hole just riveted, grain sides up. Rivet Belt Loop in place as in Step 5. Repeat Steps 5 and 6 on other Belt Loop.











STEP 7. Place ball of Brass Button in hole in Anvil. Push hole in bottom of Front down over post, flesh side up. Place washer over post on leather. Set hole in Rivet Setter No. 1783 over post of Button and strike setter with a mallet to drive the washer down tight against the leather.




STEP 8. If post sticks up more than 1/8" above the washer, cut post off close to washer with side or end cutters.



STEP 9. Set concave recess of Rivet Setter No. 1783 over post and strike setter with a mallet, turning setter as you strike, to round the end of the post as it spreads over the washer. When setter is removed, a few blows with a hammer may be used to flatten the post end more.


STEP 10. Very lightly dampen edges of Gusset on flesh side. Lay Gusset on work surface, grain side up. Using a straight edge, fold 1/4" of edges of Gusset up and shape with a bone folder.




STEP 11. Using a No. 5 Overstitch Wheel, mark stitch holes in gouge on Front only.




STEP 12. Apply Craftsman Cement along edges of one side of Gusset on flesh side and around stitch line on flesh side of Front. Aligning notches in bottom of Front and center of Gusset, adhere Front to Gusset, flesh sides together.





LARGE AND SMALL POWDER FLASK HOLDERS






READ ALL INSTRUCTIONS CAREFULLY BEFORE BEGINNING ASSEMBLY SELECT APPROPRIATE PATTERNS FOR YOUR SIZE POWDER FLASK

STEP 1. Trace chosen patterns onto tracing film to preserve paper patterns. Lightly case your leather and place traced patterns onto the grain side of the leather. Trace around the patterns with a stylus or a dried ball point pen. Mark all holes and stitch lines.



STEP 2. Cut Flask Holder parts out of leather with a sharp knife or Super Shears. Punch all holes with the size Mini Punch marked on pattern.



IF YOU ARE GOING TO TOOL YOUR HOLDER, DO SO NOW. WE DO NOT RECOMMEND CEMENTING THE LEATHER TO CARDBOARD BEFORE TOOLING UNLESS YOU ARE GOING TO LINE YOUR FLASK HOLDER. DO NOT DYE LEATHER AT THIS TIME.

STEP 3. Using a No. 8047 Stitching Groover, gouge around stitch line on Front, Back and Button Patch.

STEP 4. Apply rubber cement to flesh side of Holder Front along stitch line and to flesh side of Back edges where Front will be stitch. Align front corners of Front and Back, flesh sides together and adhere around stitch lines, keeping edges aligned.


STEP 5. Immerse leather in water until bubbles quit forming. When leather has dried back to its original color, but is still cool to the touch, it is ready to form. Push Flask into the Holder. Mold leather with fingers around the Flask. Leave the Flask in the Holder until leather is thoroughly dry. Remove Flask and pull pieces apart where cemented.

FORMING HOLDER AROUND FLASK




STEP 6. Using a No. 5 Overstitch Wheel, mark stitching holes in gouge line on grain side of Button Patch.



STEP 7. Place ball of Brass Button in hole in anvil. Push hole in center of Button Patch down over post, flesh side up. Place washer over post on leather. Set hole in Rivet Setter over post of Button and strike it with a mallet to drive the washer down tight against the leather.



STEP 8. If post sticks up more than $1/8^{\prime\prime}$ above the washer, cut post off close to washer with side or end cutters.




STEP 9. Set concave recess of Rivet Setter over post and strike setter with a mallet, turning setter as you strike to round the end of the post as it spreads over the washer. When setter is removed, a few blows with a hammer may be used to flatten the post end more.

STEP 10. Cement Button Patch in place as indicated on pattern sheet, grain sides up.




STEP 11. Saddle Stitch Button Patch in place, following instructions in the back of this booklet.




STEP 12. Apply cement to tip end of Belt Loop on grain side and to area marked in center of Back on grain side. Fold Belt Loop over and adhere to Back as shown. Saddle Stitch in place following instructions in the back of this booklet.






STEP 13. Apply Craftsman Cement around areas cemented in Step 4. Adhere Front to Back as in Step 4.




STEP 14. Mark stitching holes in gouge on Front with a No. 5 Overstitch Wheel.




STEP 15. Following instructions in the back of this booklet, Saddle Stitch Front to Back.

SADDLE STITCHING




STEP 1. Push one end of thread through eye of needle about $\frac{1}{2}$ ".




STEP 2. Pierce thread with needle point as shown.




STEP 3. Push thread up on needle to eye. Pull ½" end of thread through eye as far as it will go. Hold needle and pull thread over eye of needle. Repeat this on other end of thread with other needle.




STEP 4: After holes are marked with No. 5 Overstitch Wheel, Stab hole with stitching awl. Insert one needle through hole and pull through until you have an even amount of thread on each side of the leather.




STEP 5. Stab next hole. Insert needle on back or inside of leather through hole and pull thread through.



STEP 6. Insert needle from outside or front of leather through same hole, being careful to go over first thread. DO NOT PIERCE THREAD. Pull through. Grasp both threads and pull stitch snug. Continue stitching this way until you reach last hole.




STEP 7. Go through last hole with both threads and pull stitch snug. Stitch back through last two stitches to secure thread. Trim thread off close to leather. Tap all stitches down with a mallet.



STEP 8. Run Overstitch Wheel over all of the stitches.




STEP 1. After stitching is done, use a No. 2 Edge Beveler to edge both sides of project. Hold beveler at approximately a 45 degree angle.




STEP 2. Moisten the edges of the leather and rub briskly back and forth with a Circle Edge Slicker to create a smooth burnished edge.



STEP 3. For a more professional look, apply Edge Dressing to all finished edges with a felt dauber. 60





