This PDF file contains 1 (one) Doodle Page. The PDF has been put together to give you options when it comes to printing. Pages and patterns that are larger than 8½x11 have been provided in two formats:



1) Full Size

If you would like to have a full size print out, take the full size pages to your local print shop and they can print it for you. All full size Doodle Pages are 11x17



2) Tiled

The tiled pages give you the option of printing the full sized Doodle Pages at home. You print the tiled pages and then assemble them to make the larger patterns.


The Doodle Page PDF files are typically laid out like this:


Front – full sized, front – tiled, back – full sized, back – tiled (Some Doodle Pages do not have backs)

Please note: When printing on a home printer, the edges may get cut off. To avoid this, make sure "Page Scaling" is set to "Shrink to Printable Area" in the Adobe Reader print dialogue box. This will decrease the size of the Doodle Page a very small amount.



You may take this PDF file to your local print shop to have the full-size pages printed for your own personal use.





STAMP SCENIC DESIGNS

Now — with the addition of several NEW Craftool stamps you can do picture belts, billfolds, or any other leather projects that look like a pro did 'em.

If you look closely, you'll find that the small figures (horses, saddles, dancers, etc.) are STAMPS — not carvings. These patterns contain only very simple swivel knife work. The fences, the rolling hills in the background, the hitching rails and the tree trunks are lines any leathercrafter can do and do well. So turn your work into really professional pieces and sit back to hear 'em brag on you.

To do the fence and trees, take Craftaid no. 3201, by Christine Stanley, and rub the fence (and trees and buildings if you wish) onto your cased belt — very lightly. Then place your horse stamps wherever you want them preferably between the trees or in open spaces. Carefully stamp the animals FIRST, then with your swivel knife, cut your fence lines very lightly. As shown at the bottom of the page, you can make neat little bushes, trees and other shrubbery with the pointed beveler no. F976. Keep the point of the beveler very close to the last point stamped and turn your stamp after each lick. Practice on scrap first — if your points have too much space between them it won't look good.


You don't have to follow the patterns — any arrangement you come up with will look good if your stamping is cleanly done. Remember, when using stamps this large, it's important to (1) be sure stamp is not turned upside down or sideways and (2) use a heavy mallet. While you're firmly holding the stamp handle, push down and strike the stamp hard enough to make a clean sharp imprint with the first lick so you can re-seat the stamp perfectly for subsequent licks. The best proceedure is to strike the stamp, remove it and look, reseat and strike until you have achieved the depth desired. The thickness of the leather is the factor that determines how deep to make the stampings.







RIGHT FOOTPRINT


