









Digital Downloads

This PDF package has been put together to give you options when it comes to printing. Some PDF file downloads may contain some documents larger than an 8-1/2" x 11" image. Pages and patterns that are larger than 8%x11 have been provided in two formats:



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Tiled: The tiled pages give you the option of printing the larger patterns at home. You print the tiled pages and then assemble them to make the larger patterns.



<u>Pattern PDF files</u> are typically laid out as follows: Cover (if applicable), instructions sheets (if applicable), pattern 1 – full sized, pattern 2 – full sized, pattern 2 – tiled, pattern 3 – full sized, pattern 3 – tiled. ...Etc.


<u>Doodle Page PDF files</u> are typically laid out as follows: Front – full sized, front – tiled, back – full sized, back – tiled (Some Doodle Pages do not have backs).

<u>eBook PDF files</u> contain 1 (one) full eBook. All pages in the PDF are full sized. This means that you may have to take the PDF to a print shop for certain oversized books if your home printer cannot print the larger pages.

<u>Craftaid PDF files</u> contain 1 (one) full Craftaid pattern or Craftaid pattern pack that has been converted into a tracing pattern. All pages in the PDF are full sized. This means that you may have to take the PDF to a print shop for certain oversized Craftaid patterns if your home printer cannot print the larger pages. *NOTE: These digitized patterns do not include any of the physical plastic templates (Craftaids) that may be mentioned, nor does the purchase of this PDF file imply a promise to receive any physical plastic templates (Craftaids).*

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NOTE: Some patterns may reference tools, and other items no longer available.

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"RIGHT AND WRONG" by AL STOHLMAN

The geometric and border stamps shown, are used to stimulate a keener interest in "set" stamping. Try them on the backs of brief cases, album covers, etc., or as an over-all pattern with inset initials or a floral spray such as shown on this doodle page.

Study the RIGHT & WRONG methods of using the stamps.

- Notice how smooth the beveling is on the flower, scroll, leaf, and around the design itself. Using the proper sized bevelers permits faster, smoother, and easier work. Notice how #203 caused rough beveling on the "WRONG" scroll.
- 2. Pear-shaders are made in various sizes for the same reason. When using the vertical ribbed pear-shader, as shown here with #219, always remember that the serrations should run toward the center of the flower or conform to the general sweep of the stems and scrolls to enhance their beauty. Compare the RIGHT and WRONG . . . notice the difference,
- 3. SEEDS: #722. First, stamp in the outside row; then fill in the center. Notice how the veiner #821 radiates from the flower center and conforms to the over-all shape of the acanthus leaf and turns-in, as it nears the tip. Study the examples.
- 4. The "cams" #455 #940, can "make" or "break" your work. Space them evenly. They appear best when both points are not fully imprinted in the design. Tap lightly as you begin and end with the "cams". Compare the two examples.
- End petal and leaf cuts with stops #907 #908. Space the mule foot #857 carefully. Hit with less firmness as it "fades" away from the stops. Use care in stamping these tools.
- 6. The undercut beveler #61 is especially adapted to inside curves and gives a very raised effect. Great care should be exercised in its use to keep from stamping through the leather.
- 7. A good job of backgrounding requires a steady even pressure with the mallet or striking stick. Use care not to smash down parts of the design or leave barren, ragged areas. Decorative cuts are essential. However, it is better to have a few well placed cuts than too many poor ones. Practice—practice!1

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
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
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
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PICTURE AND FIGURE CARVING

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






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


MORE ABOUT FIGURE CARVING by Al Stohlman

The trend toward figure carving is definite. In the past, the desire was prevailing but the knowledge of where and how to begin was lacking. Now, with the introduction of the new book "How to Carve Leather" by Al Stohlman, the craft has been given the opportunity to "get its feet wet" in the fun, exciting, limitless new field of figure carving.

Beginning this month we are featuring a Craftool of the Month. Each month we will feature a different tool and show how and where to use it, as far as space permits. This month, Al shows what can be done with a few figure carving tools. The Craftool of the Month #899 and its two counterparts #898 and #900 are used extensively around the figures bordering the page. These tools bevel and matt down the background; add bolder relief to the carving; create a pleasing texture.

Should difficulty be encountered in cutting the small figures of the design, try the #34 Junior swivel cutter, this has 4'' angle blade #100N. It is an excelent combination for medium sized or small hands. The 4'' angle blade will fit all Craftool swivel knives.





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


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
SPRINGTIME by Al Stohlman

In the springtime a young man's fancy turns to love, but "Ol' Man Craftool" fancies himself already on his summer vacation an' fishin' along some shady stream as carved at left; plenty of playful rainbow trout, shoes off, line in the water, a restful position and doin' some real fishing'. Notice a couple of Craftools stickin' out of his pocket.

Bevel inside the large fish silhouette with Craftool of the Month #896. This tool is used for most all of the beveling around the fish, the water ripples and lifty pads, where flat beveling is desired. The lifty pads are beveled around very lightly to give them the appearance of laying on the surface of the water. #896 is also used to flatten the top of the lifty pads by tapping lightly. In figure carving, you must learn to strengthen or lessen your blows on the tool to gain the desired effect. Notice how heavily the leaping fish has been beveled around . . . yet the water ripples are beveled lightly and smoothly with the same tool.

Trying #34 Junior size swivel cutter. The $\frac{1}{4}$ " angle blade #100N is excellent for cutting the eyes of frog and fish and the small details.

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
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
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CRAFTOOL OF THE MONTH


This month's Doodle Page features Craftool #911 . . . shown with the new figure carving tools. This tool is actually a 3 in 1 stamp. It is a pear shader, a ribbed beveler left, a ribbed beveler right. This enables the craftsman to bevel both sides of a midrib with angled serrations without changing tools, as an the oak leaf in the center of the page and the two leaves at its right.

Notice how #911 was used on the acanthus leaves in the upper left hand corner. It is also used to form radiating lines from the flower centers and give the seeds a "set-in" appearance, #911 adapts itself well to the scrolls. Many interesting combinations can be formed.

Space here does not permit all the uses of Craftool #911. Try it yourself on scrap leather and discover its amazing qualities. Doodle with it just as Al Stohlman has this month with the peacock.

Try it on a bag!

Some of the other new tools, Nos. 903-904-905-906-907-908, are all designed as "stops" and are shown in various uses on this page. Try them!





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
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BIG GAME by Al Stohlman


Continuing our silhouette series, Al Stohlman takes us to the north woods after big game—wallet size! Craftcol of the Month #895 is used to bevel the body contours and muscles of all the animals on this page. Bevel around the head and face with Craftcols #891 and #890. They are used extensively in and around the overturned boxes and pots and pans that the bear is getting into. Use #893 and #894 to bevel between the poles of the lean-to that is covered with pine boughs. Pine trees are made with #707.

Use the pointed bevelers #902, #941, #976 between the animals' legs, antlers, forks of the trees, etc. To gain depth where a checked background is destred, first bevel with Craftools #936, #701, #803 . . . then matt around the figures and sky area as shown with Craftools #898, #899, #900. After all beveling, the modeling tool is used to smooth out any tool marks and to "scratch-in" small details such as facial expressions, etc.

It is suggested that the craftsman try the No. 34 Swivel Cutter with the No. 100N angle blade. This is a junior size cutter and is excellent for cutting the small details of figure carving where a great amount of pressure is not required. The angle blade permits smaller turns; more visibility. For comfortable carving, try the No. 34 Swivel Cutter, Blade No. 100N fits all Craftool Swivel Cutters.



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


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ALASKA



With summer bearing down, we think of cooler places. Al Stohlman takes us a little farther north this month to—Alaska.

Craftool of the Month #891 is used extensively on the dogs, around their harness, and the sled detail; also between the prongs of the caribou's antiers and to bevel the Eskimo in his kayak. Most of the face contours and muscles of the dogs, wolf and bear are beveled with #891. Smooth out any rough beveling marks and add small facial details and expression with the Craftool #3 modeling tool. Add the "hair" to dogs and wolf with #431 or any similar Craftool camouflage tool. Bevel outlines of the dogs with #895 and #896. Matt background smoothly, to retain snow effect, with Craftool #897. Dog tracks are easily made with tip of undercut beveler #892.

The snow-covered pine tree in the left foreground is made with Craftool #910. Cut only the top line of the outer branches then bevel with #896. The remainder of the tree is formed entirely with #910, setting the points very closely together. The illusion of snow is created by blank areas between the branches.

The No. 100N angle blade is a "must" for craftsmen cutting the small tigures, details of the harness, etc. The angle blade fits all Craftool knives. The No. 34 Swivel Cutter is ideal for small hands.







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
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

For this month's page Jack McDougall of Toronto, Canada, and Al Stohlman, good neighbors, work together to bring the craft a fine example of floral and tigure carving. Jack is noted as one of Canada's finest carvers and each year is featured at the Canadian National Exhibitions. Study his outstanding work.

Craftool of the Month #104 is featured. Primarily it is used as a background tool and it was used thusly to background the floral design but it was also used to make the turbulent water of the stream. Notice only the point of the tool was used in a chopping manner with #888 to simulate spray and splash of the water. Craftool #104 was also used to form the distant trees. Notice that the outlines of the trees were not cut. This gives the illusion of distance with only the tree tops finished with tiny knife cuts.

Many new and interesting effects can be achieved with Craftool of the Month #104. It is one of the most versatile tools in the Craftool line. No craftsman should be without one.

TIP: Use a No. 4 well pointed brush for dyeing the figures. Dilute the dark brown dye with alcohol or methanol, How To Carve Leather, by Al Stohlman, features the Dye Chart Method and step by step instructions for dyeing figures.




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
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


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


Craftool No. 902 is a small but important beveler. Some of its many uses are shown (see small arrows). The student figure carver should study well its many uses. It is one of the tools in the No. 6 Kit.

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CRAFTOOL OF THE MONTH No. 707

Craftool No. 707 "shell tool" has many uses . . . some of which are illustrated on this month's Doodle Page by Al Stohlman. Note how it was used to "pink" around the scroll, "A" . . . as "stops" and veins of the acanthus leaf, "B" . . . and to decorate the edges of the small leaves, "C" . . . and the flower Petals, "D". Craftool No. 707 is used effectively for veining the rose leaves. Study its use on the morning glory and the oval frame surrounding the marsh hawk at left. Pay particular attention to its use on the wing and tail feathers of the hawk. It is also used to make the pine trees, "Figure Carving" & "How To Carve Leather" by Al Stohlman gives complete step-by-step instructions for carving pine trees, birds, etc. Pay your Craftool dealer a visit and have him show you these marvelous books.


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


THE FOREST by Al Stohlmon

Here, the striking effects of Craftool of the Month No. 910 are shown. With proper use, the texture created by No. 910 is perfectly adapted to the pine and fir trees. Complete mastery of the tool, as shown by Al Stohlman, will require much practice, but with this practice, it can be mastered by all and easier, perhaps, than anticipated. Study this month's Doodle Page very closely. Note how the impressions of No. 910 are spaced very close together and in an irregular patient to create the realism of the trees.

Craftool No. 910 is also used to make shrubs and bushes. It is used to accent the wing feathers of birds at upper left. Note its many uses on the floral design at the right. Get Craftool No. 910 right away and start having fun!


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


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
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THE HOLD-UP by Al Stohlman


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
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
